Unprofessional Conduct For Psychologists Title 26, Vermont Statutes Annotated, Chapter 55, Section 3016

§3016. Unprofessional Conduct Unprofessional conduct shall include:

(1) Fraudulent or deceptive procuring or use of a license;

(2) Willfully making or filing false reports or records in the practice of psychology, willfully impeding or obstructing the proper making or filing of reports or records, or failing to file the proper reports or record;

(3) Advertising which is intended to or has a tendency to

deceive the public;

(4) Exercising undue influence on or taking improper advantage of a person using psychological service, or promoting the sale of services or goods in a manner which exploits a person for financial gain of the practitioner or of

(5) Failure to comply with the statutes governing the practice of psychology;

(6) Conviction of a crime that evinces an unfitness to practice psychology:

(7) Failing to make available, upon request of a person using psychological services to succeeding health care

professionals or institutions, copies of that person's records in the possession or under control of the lie

(8) Practicing psychology when medically or psycholog unfit to do so;

(9) Failing to use a complete title in professional activit

(10) Conduct which evidences moral unfitness to practi psychology;

(11) Gross or repeated malpractice;

(12) Engaging in any sexual conduct with a client, or w Immediate family member of a client, with whom licensee has had a professional relationship within previous two years;

(13) Harassing, intimidating, or abusing a client or pati

(14) Entering into an additional relationship with a clie supervisee, research participant or student that im psychologist's objectivity or otherwise interfere wi psychologist's professional obligation;

(15) Practicing outside or beyond a psychologist's area training or competence without appropriate super

Vermont Secretary of State Office of Professional Regulation

The Office of professional Regulation provides Vermont licenses, certifications, and registrations for over 37,000 practitioners and businesses. As of July 1, 1996, 23 professions are regulated by appointed boards and commissions and 13 professions are regulated by the Director with appointed advisors. A list of professions is on the reverse side.

Each profession or occupation is governed by laws defining professional conduct. Consumers who have inquiries or wish to obtain a form to register a complaint may do so by calling:

Upon receipt of a complaint, an administrative review determines if the issues raised are covered by the applicable professional conduct statute. If so, a committee is assigned to investigate, collect information, and recommend action or closure to the appropriate governing body.

All complaint investigations are confidential. Should the investigation conclude with a decision for disciplinary action against a professional's license and ability to practice, the name of the license holder will be made public.

Disciplinary action through the Office of Professional Regulation ranges from reprimand to revocation of license but does not involve financial compensation or restoration, with some exceptions. Financial restoration, can be pursued through private attorneys, small claims couns, or other available remedies.
